When I joined Michigan Alpha more than 30 years ago, I gained the opportunity to follow in the steps of a great man, my father, **John Buck '54**. I also learned that there were many other distinguished Phis, both in this chapter and across the nation, that provided paths worthy of following.

I had my chance to become one of the caretakers of the fraternity while attending U of M as a student. As an alum, I decided to embrace Phi Delta Theta's principle that this is a fraternity for life. It is a pleasure to serve as President of the Alumni Association and have the opportunity to advance a worthwhile legacy for those who will follow.

It has been especially rewarding for me to transmit the fraternity to another great man, my son, **Jon Buck '08**, and all the other great men who are here in this room as active members of Michigan Alpha.

A New Generation of Michigan Alpha Men Saved the Fraternity

About a decade ago, there was a serious risk that we would not be here tonight. That risk was caused by Michigan Alpha active members in the late-1990's who took the fraternity down a slippery slope that diverged from our core values.

Unfortunately, it became necessary to end Michigan Alpha's 111 years of continuous operations in the fall of 1998, following a number of major violations of the Phi Delta Theta General Headquarter's (GHQ) policies prohibiting alcohol in the chapter house.

Thankfully, during the fall of 2003, a new generation of Michigan Alpha men stepped up to the daunting task of restoring the chapter despite the naysayers and risks. Most of the seniors here today were among the Third Founding Fathers who recolonized the chapter.

The Alumni Association understands the enormous challenges you've faced and the sacrifices you made. We are very proud of your accomplishments.

Strive to be the Leaders and the Best

Michigan Alpha offers opportunities to socialize in a responsible manner, participate in competitive intramural team sports, learn leadership skills through management of the chapter and develop friendships that can last a lifetime. We own one of the most historic, and best maintained, chapter houses on campus.

Based on my conversations with alumni leaders of other fraternities and the U of M Office of Greek Life officials, I think it is accurate to say that Michigan Alpha provides the most well-rounded fraternity experience on campus.

Michigan Alpha is a source of immense pride for me and more than 1,000 fellow living alums. Tonight, let us recommit to a pledge similar to the one we gave that day our association with Phi Delta Theta began.

Whether an alum or an active member, let us work together to strive to transmit the fraternity to those who follow after, not less, but greater than, it was transmitted to us.

Thank you all for the chance to share my heartfelt feelings about our great fraternity.

Martin Newcomer '38 Remembers Campus and Fraternity Life in the 1930s

The following is an excerpt of brother Newcomer's recollections submitted for the **Michigan Alpha Heritage Project**. His entire submission can be viewed on our web site at **www.pdtma.com**.



I entered the University of Michigan in 1931...There were no men's dorms to provide room and board in those days, so joining a fraternity was a comfortable alternative to a rooming house and eatery.

Phi Delt provided excellent dining, with steak served every Wednesday night. Room and board then was \$75 a month, and tuition was \$125 a semester in the Engine School.

A very strict auto ban was in effect with absolutely no use of a car except to carry out the duties of one's employment...One lucky Phi Delt was Phil Garvey, a graduate student from Michigan State, who was allowed to drive. Many times his two-door car would disgorge 6 or 7 passengers.

Following my sophomore year, I took two years off due to the Great Depression. I returned in 1935...The house had a housemother, Mrs. Loranger, and then Mrs. Mott, plus the houseman, Oliver, and the cook, Red.

Activities were tuned to sports. Sports figures achieving success were football stars: Tom Harmon, Whitey Wistert, Cece Cantrell and John Smithers. Ed Wilson starred as a wrestler, Al Saunders was captain of the golf team, Paul Keeler was a swimmer and E. Reed Low played hockey.

Reed Low was the instigator of the annual Mud Bowl game with the SAE house. This was a natural for Low, since he had always been a self-starter.

I have many happy memories of the fraternity.

Brant said, "I've had some of my best collegiate experiences and memories as a member of Phi Delta Theta. Phi Delt has been an integral part of my development into the person I am today."

"The leadership opportunities and friendships I've developed through Michigan Alpha will stay with me throughout my life. I'm truly proud to be a Phi."

ALS is a major national philanthropic focus of Phi Delta Theta. The disease claimed the life of Brother **Lou Gehrig** (Columbia University '25) and currently afflicts as many as 30,000 Americans. In Michigan, it is estimated that there are more than 1,000 people with ALS, and about 200 who are newly diagnosed on an annual basis.

ALS of Michigan Director Susan Burstein-Kahn said, "We greatly appreciate the hard work of the Michigan Phi Delts to raise much needed money to fight this disease. All the funds will be used to support the mission of ALS of Michigan."

This event marked the third year that Michigan Alpha has raised funds to benefit ALS. All combined, the three "Walk & Roll" events have raised a total of more \$35,000.



Chip Warrick Named M Club Bob Ufer Award Winner for 2007



The Letterwinners M Club has named **Woodward A. "Chip" Warrick, Jr.** '47 as the 2007 winner of the Ufer Award.

Established during 1981 in memory of legendary U of M athlete and long-time football announcer **Bob Ufer '43**, the M Club's Ufer Award is annually presented to an individual for his or her outstanding service to the U of M Athletic Department.

Over the last seven decades, Warrick has built up a long list of accomplishments at, and in support of, the University. He was a member of the U of M wrestling teams of 1943 and 1944. Warrick earned an Engineering degree in 1946 and then obtained a degree from the Michigan Business School in 1947.

After college, Warrick maintained a close affiliation with the University by serving as President of the U of M Club of Cincinnati in 1961 and 1962, as well as President of the M Club in 1967.

According to the M Club, Warrick was instrumental in the move to admit women into the organization and on its executive board. He also played a key role in the creation of the Ufer Award. It is worth noting that Ufer was Warrick's college roommate.

The M Club also credits Warrick with helping to develop in the early 1960s a pipeline of strong Michigan football recruits from the Cincinnati area including Bob Timberlake, Mel Anthony and Carl Ward among other standouts. More recently, the M Club has recognized Warrick's significant support for U of M's new and much improved wrestling facilities.

Warrick is the third Michigan Alpha alumnus to receive this prestigious award -- other winners were **Douglas F. Roby '23** and **Don Lund '45**.

Grashoff Leads Fundraising for U of M Urology Department



One of Phi Delta Theta's core values is encouraging members to serve the community as well as the fraternity.

Phillip A. Grashoff, Jr. '66 is a Michigan Alpha alum who has demonstrated a true commitment to ser-

vice as a past member of the Alumni Association Board of Directors and a leader in numerous civic organizations.

Charlie Green's Streak Ends, but Long Service to U of M Continues Worked 250+ Consecutive Wolverine Football Games from 1967 to 2007



Although he was born in Ohio, **Charlie Green '58** long ago became a Michigan Man. During 2002, the Letterwinners M Club awarded Green an honorary U of M Athletic Letter in recognition of his long tenure of distinguished service to the Athletic Department

Michigan Alpha has also been the beneficiary of Green's dedication to the University. He served as President of the Alumni Association during the late 1980s and has supported the fraternity in countless other ways over the years.

Green is in his 48th year working within the U of M Department of Intercollegiate Athletics program. Since 1960, Green has been associated with the U of M Golf Course in both part-time and full-time roles. He is the current Club House Manager.

In 1967, Green began working in the Michigan Stadium Press Box as a statistician and most recently as the game clock operator. He worked more than 250 consecutive football games without a miss, until the illness of his wife forced him to end his streak

during the 2007 season. He is back for the 2008 season.

Green also started working at the scorers table (middle of above picture) for U of M Men's Basketball in 1967 as a statistician, scoreboard operator and official timer. For the past 14 years, he has been the official timer for U of M Women's Basketball.

A native of Dayton, Ohio, Green received his B.S. Degree from U of M in 1958, Teaching Certificate in 1959 and M.A. Degree in 1965 from Eastern Michigan. He taught algebra and geometry for 33 years in the Willow Run and Taylor Public Schools before retiring in 1993. Green resides in Ann Arbor with his wife Jean. They have two children, Sean and Eileen.
