Michigan Alpha PDT Named 2016 Fraternity of the Year by University of Michigan Interfraternity Council

Strong Membership and Many Achievements Recognized by Greek Leadership

On April 11, 2016, Phi Delta Theta at the University of Michigan was recognized at the Greek Life awards for their excellence in Greek Life and involvement in the University of Michigan community. Michigan Alpha won an award for Risk Management and was named the 2016 Fraternity of the Year. Phi Delta Theta at University of Michigan has shown excellence in areas such as philanthropy, recruitment, risk management and Greek Life/campus involvement just to name a few. Michigan Alpha had the largest fraternity team at Dance Marathon at the University of Michigan this year and held a successful annual Boxcar Derby, raising funds and awareness for Ann Arbor Active Against ALS. In regard to recruitment, the chapter had its largest fall Phikeia class since re-founding in 2004 with 28 members and added 10 members



in the Winter Semester.

This past year, Phi Delt has contributed to leadership roles in Wolverine Support Network, Dance Marathon, the largest student organization on campus, and a newly elected representative to Central Student Government. Finally, Michigan Alpha has excelled in the classroom, maintaining a chapter wide GPA that is higher than the all-male average at the University.

Alumnus Legacy Leads Michigan Alpha for First Time in Decades

At the beginning of the 2016 Winter Semester, *The Sword & Shield* asked active chapter President **Bernard Insalaco '18** questions about his views on the state of Michigan Alpha, goals for the year and perspective of a legacy:

Q: How is the PDT doing overall within the U of M Greek System?

A: Phi Delta Theta (PDT) has made tremendous strides since its re-founding at U of M in 2004. We believe PDT offers the best overall fraternity experience in the U of M Greek System. The

nity experience in the U of M Greek System. The chapter has achieved an outstanding balance with excellence in academics, athletics, social and philanthropy.

Currently, PDT has 112 active brothers with a Winter Phikeia class of ten members. Recruitment during this academic year has gone exceptionally well. In the 2015 Fall Rush, more than 250 men visited or expressed interest in joining PDT. We extended 31 bids with 29 acceptances. During the 2016 Winter Rush, we extended 12 bids and had 11 acceptances.

With a total of 112 members, PDT is above the average chapter size on campus of 82. It is not our goal to be the largest chapter on

campus, but to maintain a high standard for our members.

This thinking is reflected in the fact that we only offered

bids to approximately 10% of the men who rushed PDT. We are particularly proud that our bid acceptance rate was 93%. While we are highly selective, the members have diverse backgrounds and a range of majors.

Michigan Alpha has continued to hold high academic standards amongst Michigan Greeks. Currently, the chapter has maintained a 3.35 GPA, which is tied for 12th out of 28 fraternities. This GPA is more impressive when one considers that about 50% of the active members are in the Engineering School which traditionally scores students lower than the School of Literature, Science and the Arts.

Our philanthropic efforts continue to illustrate our involvement on campus. Currently, we are in the midst of our fundraising for our 8th annual Boxcar Derby, which will be held in front of the Big House on April 10 to benefit Ann Arbor Active Against ALS. We expect to break our fundraising total from last year which was approximately \$6,000.

The brotherhood also raised over \$3,000 for Winterfest which is an annual fraternity-wide broomball tournament benefiting the Autism Alliance of Michigan. In addition, PDT had the largest fraternity team at Dance Marathon this year with 35 members. At Dance Marathon, brothers raised funds and awareness for rehabilitation programs for children at C.S. Mott's Children's Hospital.

Q: What are your goals for the year as president?

A: Goals for the upcoming year are to increase campus leadership involvement, boost fundraising and awareness for our Boxcar Derby and improve upperclassmen involvement. With U of M being such a large school, I feel that it is crucial to have leadership roles on campus so that our voices can be heard when decisions are being made.

Currently, we have a brother running for Central Student Government as well as a brother on the Social Responsibility Committee which is a well-respected position among Greeks.

In regard to Boxcar, we have increased the number of teams participating in

this event, but we also would like to break our fundraising total. Last year was a significant increase from our normal fundraising total, but we are striving to break our record for benefiting Ann Arbor Active Against ALS.

Keeping juniors and seniors involved is a perennial struggle in the Greek System and Michigan Alpha is no exception. With the combination of tougher academics, graduate school preparation, job searches and other factors on a campus that offers so many tremendous opportunities, upperclassmen tend to be very busy. However, I think we can establish new initiatives to utilize their experience and expertise.

Q: How has your status as a legacy affected your fraternity experience?

A: I believe my legacy status has affected my fraternity experience in a highly positive way. I come from a family where everyone has Greek Life blood in them. My father was a PDT Michigan Alpha Man, my mother a Delta Gamma at U of M, and my two older brothers were Phi Sigma Kappa at Villanova University.

One of the reasons that I wanted to join PDT was seeing the bonds my father still has with this fraternity brothers to this day. Whether traveling to Vermont to spend the weekend skiing or coming back to Ann Arbor for a football game, I saw that my dad had built great friendships that he has maintained more than thirty years after graduating.

Having my parents and brothers in Greek Life showed me the camaraderie and many opportunities that come with joining a fraternity, but I was especially proud that to follow my father in being a Michigan Alpha legacy. He told me many stories of how dominant PDT was on campus during his era. That was a big factor in my decision to run for chapter president because I wanted to build on the past 12 years of progress to restore Michigan Alpha to greatness.

Q: How is Michigan Alpha different and similar today to the fraternity when your father was an active?

A: There are many similarities and differ-

ences in Michigan Alpha from 1984 and 2016. Something similar to my father's experience is the daily routines brothers find themselves doing. After dinner at the house ends around 6:30, you will find a pack of Phis walking to the Undergraduate Library while stopping at 7-Eleven along the way to pick up some much needed caffeine. Good Time Charley's is still a popular destination for brothers on Friday nights for "happy hour."

If someone were to ask a brother about the time of day, or to answer the phone, that brother could give the same extensive response that Michigan Alpha brothers have learned for decades. Of course, a major change established during the 2004 re-founding is that the chapter fully complies with PDT General Headquarters' (GHQ) rules for pledge education that preclude some of the activities done in the past. PDT GHQ rules implemented for all chapters in 2000 mandate that no alcoholic beverages can be consumed, or possessed, in the chapter house. As a result, the chapter house today does not host the same type of social activities that it traditionally did, but Michigan Alpha still maintains a very active social calendar off fraternity-owned property as allowed by PDT GHQ and local laws.

Another similarity is that brothers take tremendous pride in our historic chapter house. I believe that, both then and now, we have the nicest fraternity house on campus at U of M. Some differences in the chapter house are a lack of window beds and the "Blue Room," formally known as "New Room," was transformed into a weight room for brothers to work out in.

Perhaps the biggest difference is the absence of PDT vs. SAE Mud Bowl during Homecoming. SAE ended 64 years of tradition in 1998 when they turned the Mud Bowl into a tournament following suspension of Michigan Alpha. PDT has participated in the tournament, but has not made it to the finals in the Mud Bowl. Of course, the SAE National Headquarters' four to six years suspension of SAE's U of M chapter starting at the end of the 2015-2016 school year leaves the future of the Mud Bowl unclear.

The Michigan Alpha Alumni Association reached out to the SAE Alumni Association with a proposal to run the Mud Bowl during SAE's absence from campus, but it was rejected. The SAE Alumni Association said they plan to continue the tournament format with the championship played on Homecoming; however, the U of M Interfraternity Council may not allow for Greek organizations to participate a non-sanctioned fraternal event.

We will closely monitor how the situation with Mud Bowl develops, but in the meantime there are many photos and memorabilia in PDT's Trophy Room that celebrate Michigan Alpha's role in establishing the Mud Bowl and many victories in the rivalry match.

Q: What message do you have for alums who have a son considering U of M?

A: I highly recommend that alums encourage their sons to take advantage of the outstanding opportunities that U of M offers. Michigan's academics are consistently ranked among the best in the nation and have a long tradition of producing highly successful graduates.

Of course, not all learning takes place in the classroom, and the U of M Greek System offers leadership development and life experiences that enrich a collegiate experience. U of M's Greek System is one of the strongest in the nation with 28 organizations for men and 16 for women. The U of M IFC and Office of Greek Life have been working closely to implement new rules and programs to make the fraternity experience more safe,

positive and productive. I am gratified to say PDT is a leader in those efforts.

We always welcome legacies to meet the brothers and see what Michigan Alpha has to offer. As has always been the case, legacies are not guaranteed a bid, but brothers certainly will reach out and make an extra effort to get to know them. We know Michigan Alpha has a great tradition in many U of M families, and we're doing our best to ensure this opportunity will always be available for them. With the support of alums and their legacies, we believe Michigan Alpha's future is very bright.



The Phi Delta Theta General Headquarters has strongly encouraged chapters to place greater emphasis on scholarship during the last couple of years. The Alumni Association has also asked the active chapter to meet, and exceed, the goals set by the PDT GHQ.

Congratulations to our actives for their 3.352 fall 2015 GPA, which ranks them 12th among 30 IFC chapters at U of M. This GPA is higher than the all-men's average GPA.

Active Chapter Membership Highest in 20 Years


29 Initiate from 2015 Fall Pledge Class

Michigan Alpha's outstanding 29 member 2015 Fall Semester pledge class activated during January. This is the chapter's largest regular (not re-founding) semester pledge class since the mid-1990s. More than 250 men expressed interest in Michigan Alpha during rush, so the awarding of bids was

highly selective to build a strong, talented and diverse pledge class.

Including the 10 member 2015 Winter Semester pledge class, total chapter membership stands at 112, which may be an all-time high for Michigan Alpha. The recruiting momentum of the chapter has been growing in recent

years with the rising reputation of the chapter. Alums with sons planning to attend U of M are encouraged to reach out to the active chapter leaders as numerous legacies have joined and found the fraternity to be as enjoyable as their fathers did.

2015 Homecoming Open House a Great Success


More than 35 Alums Visit 1437 Washtenaw

South Porch Renovation Underway as Summer Project

Donation Opportunity Similar to North Porch Available

The Alumni Association has started a major renovation of the South Porch which will be completed by early fall of this year. The ceiling of "The Bin" under the porch had been deteriorating for years and finally reached the point where there were concerns about safety, although not visible from the surface of the porch. The brick walls along the porch have also deteriorated and needed significant repair.

As a result, the Alumni Association retained an architect with expertise in historic renovation to develop a plan to rebuild the South Porch to meet current building codes while maintaining the aesthetics of the overall structure. The plan will revitalize the South Porch as a


place for range of outdoor activities and better connect it to the front yard.

We are particularly pleased that his plan will make the porch, and ultimately the first floor of the chapter house, handicap-accessible for the first time ever. Making the chapter house handicap-accessible has been a long-standing goal, but the complexity and cost of the task was prohibitive as a stand-alone project. By integrating handicap accessibility into the overall renovation of the South Porch, it can be cost-effectively accomplished.

During 2008, a group of five alums from the 1950s— Dick Young '51, John Buck '54, Doug Roby '56, Bob Leland '58 and Bernie Rinella '58— donated a

total of \$12,750 to fund the majority of the renovation of the North Porch. Their outstanding donation is memorialized on a plaque on the wall inside the chapter house.

The Alumni Association obtained multiple bids and the South Porch renovation is expected to cost more than \$75,000. We invite alums to follow the lead of very generous North Porch donors and consider forming a similar group donation, which the Alumni Association would be pleased to recognize in an appropriate manner. 


